EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report is a study of the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection of the Russian Bishop's House in Sitka National Historical Site, National Park Service, Sitka, Alaska. The Russian Bishop's House is a two-story log structure that was constructed in 1842-43 by the Russian-American Company to serve as the area headquarters of the Russian Orthodox Church. It retained this use until 1969, and was acquired by the National Park Service in 1972. The building was restored to its circa-1853 appearance over a 13-year period, from 1976 to 1988. It is listed as a National Historic Landmark in the National Register of Historic Places.

The materials in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection were salvaged from the walls and ceilings of the Russian Bishop's House during its restoration by the National Park Service. The collection consists of 470 cataloged items that encompass wallpapers, various fabrics (burlap, canvas, ticking), Russian newspapers, papers with handwritten Russian script, and cardboard. Much of the collection was processed and encapsulated in clear mylar by Harpers Ferry Center, National Park Service, in the 1970s-80s. Wallpaper samples number approximately 1,400, according to park estimates, and include body wallpapers, border papers, and ceiling papers. Most of these wallpapers have been separated, while others have been retained as layers of wallpaper "sandwiches." Not included in this study were seven plywood crates filled with excess wallcoverings that had been accessioned by the park for assessment at some future date.

This study evaluated 438 of the 470 cataloged items from the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. These were shipped in May 2003 by Museum Curator Sue Thorsen from Sitka National Historical Park to the offices of the Historic Preservation Program, North Atlantic Region, in Lowell National Historical Park. The materials of this collection are from 26 rooms in the Russian Bishop's House: 16 in the first story, and 10 in the second story.¹ Most of the collection was found to consist of body wallpapers (76 patterns), followed by border papers (53 patterns), and ceiling papers (20 patterns). The earliest wallpapers, and the most complete layering sequences, were preserved in the second-story rooms. Several of these early wallpapers were replicated and hung in the 1980s. The wallpapers span a time period of approximately 100 years, from circa 1843-44 to circa 1940. The bulk of the collection, or about 78%, is of 19th-century vintage, with the remainder dating to the 20th century. Three body wallpapers, and one early sample of burlap, were identified as Russian-made, based on maker's marks printed on their back sides. American and/or English manufacturers are also represented, as evidenced by maker's marks printed in the selvage of the wallpapers.

The wallpapers for 22 rooms of the Russian Bishop's House were documented by this study using both photographs and written descriptions. Recommendations for future work include physically reorganizing the collection by room; stabilizing failing paper identification labels; correcting the provenience for selected cataloged items; and assessing the crated and unprocessed materials currently in storage at the park.

INTRODUCTION

Project Scope

The scope of this study on the "assessment and documentation of historic wallpapers at the Russian Bishop's House" is described in a project agreement dated January 17, 2003 (revised May 2, 2003) between the Historic Architecture Program, Northeast Region, National Park Service, and Sitka National Historical Park. An excerpt from this project agreement follows.

Project Description

The goal of this project is to reduce the bulk of the wallpaper collection while retaining representative samples wallpaper for each room. The wallpapers will be sorted by room and by their layer sequence within each room, as can best be determined by catalog documentation and physical evidence. Photographic and written documentation will make the collection easily accessible to both NPS staff and researchers. Conservation of the wallpapers is NOT included in this scope of work. Rather, recommendations for future conservation treatment will be provided for both the cataloged and crated wallpapers if determined necessary.

Tasks to be Accomplished

The following approach is proposed for assessing and documenting the wallpaper collection at the Russian Bishop's House:

1. Written sources will be reviewed to gain an understanding of the historic installation, evolution, documentation, and restoration of the wallpapers in the collection. Sources to be consulted include the "Historic Structure Report," the "Historic Furnishings Report," architects' site notes, and correspondence. A chronology of documented wallpaper finishes, in chart form, will thereby be established for each room. The documentation review will take place in Lowell, MA.
2. The 1,400 cataloged wallpaper samples and catalog data sheets will be air freighted via FedEx to Lowell, MA, where they will be examined, evaluated, and photographically documented. These samples will be compared with the documented wallpaper chronology established in step one above. This chronology, together with the catalog data sheets and labeling on the samples themselves, will hopefully provide sufficient information to enable sorting of the papers by room, from the earliest to the most recent papers. Circa dates will be assigned to the papers if sufficient information is available. The best representative sample of each paper will be temporarily removed from its mylar sleeve and photographed using a 35mm camera and color film. Information recorded for each wallpaper will include the following:

- Provenience (original room location)
- Wallpaper sequence

- Circa date of installation (with note as to documentation, if any)
- Wallpaper type (body, border, or ceiling paper)
- Paper type (rag or wood pulp)
- Printing type (block printed, machine printed, stenciled, or hand painted)
- Design description
- Identifying information printed in the selvage or elsewhere (e.g., manufacturer, country of origin, tax stamps, etc.)
- Whether or not a reproduction of this paper was produced by Scalamandré in the 1980s

The wallpaper samples will be returned to Sitka NHP via FedEx air freight upon completion of this phase of the project.

3. After the wallpaper chronologies for each room have been clearly established and recorded (step 2), a trip will be made to Sitka NHP to examine the contents of the seven plywood boxes containing uncataloged canvas and wallpaper materials from the Russian Bishop House. A survey of contents will be made for each box, and pertinent information recorded.

4. A report will be written assessing and documenting the wallpaper collection of the Russian Bishop's House.

The project was later revised to eliminate the one-week site visit to Sitka National Historical Park when it was determined that additional time would be needed to evaluate and document the cataloged collection that had been shipped to Lowell, Massachusetts. Also, a digital camera, rather than a 35-mm camera, was used to document the wallpapers.

Brief Historical Background: The Russian Bishop's House²

The Russian Bishop's house in Sitka, Alaska, is a two-story log structure that was constructed by the Russian-American Company for the use of the Russian Orthodox Church in 1842-43. The building served as the center of the Russian Orthodox Church authority for an area reaching from California to Siberian Kamchatka until its closure in 1969. It remained in the ownership of the Russian-American Company until 1867, when the United States gained possession of Alaska and ownership of the building was transferred to the Russian Orthodox Church in America.

While substantially completed in 1843, finishing of interior rooms remained to be done as late as 1844. Required materials included "paint, paper, and canvas," according to a report dated March 4, 1844. The walls and ceiling of the chapel had been covered with canvas by 1847, as described in an inventory of the "Home Chapel" undertaken in

that year. Repairs to the building were required only a few years later, as noted in a letter dated September 4, 1850, that observed "it is necessary to repair wallpaper or replace it, and paint the floors." This and other work was likely carried out in 1851 or 1852, based on a building-materials list dated December 1852 that included glue, sail-cloth thread, and wallpaper. The building had fallen into disrepair by 1885, as noted by travel author Eliza Scidmore who described the structure as:

. . . rambling, half-ruined. With diminished church revenues and a lessening congregation, the building has slowly fallen into a sad decay, the galleries and porches have dropped off, and only a part of the house is now occupied.³

Repairs were contracted in 1886 and completed by May 1887, which included the replacement of the end galleries; repairs of the ceilings, doors, walls, fireplaces, and floors; and installation of new canvas in five rooms, including the chapel. The ceiling of Father Donskoy's bedroom collapsed only three years later, in March 1890, due to the weight of wet insulating sand and gravel. Improvements and alterations were undertaken in the 1930s, including the installation of apartments in the first story, indoor plumbing, and electrical wiring.

The Russian Bishop's House was acquired by the National Park Service in 1972, by which time it had reached an advanced state of deterioration. Restoration of the house to its circa-1853 appearance commenced in 1975, culminating with its opening to the public in 1989.

Administrative Data

The Russian Bishop's House was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1962, and listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1971. The building is included in the National Park Service's "List of Classified Structures" (LCS) as number 005621. The LCS management category specifies that the building "must be preserved and maintained." The LCS approved treatment is restoration.

Floor plans documenting the existing conditions of the building were prepared by the National Park Service in 1975, which are included as an appendix at the end of this report.

Wallpapers and Wallcoverings of the Russian Bishop's House

Background

Wallpapers and wallcoverings were removed from the walls and ceilings of the Russian Bishop's House during the course of the building's restoration from 1976 through 1988. The existing conditions of the rooms' finishes were documented in April 1975. The first wallpapers and wallcoverings were removed in 1976 and sent to Harpers Ferry Center, Division of Museum Services, where the wallpapers were separated by Cay Childs under the supervision of staff conservator Sue Munro. Additional samples were salvaged from the first-story rooms in 1977 by Peter Snell, Historical Architect with Denver Service Center (DSC). Snell shipped the wallpapers to DSC, where they were separated and treated with thymol, an anti-fungal gas. His findings were documented in a rough-draft report dated May 1978. Investigation of the finishes in the second-story rooms commenced in the fall of 1979, under the direction of Historical Architects John Robbins and David Snow, also with DSC. Robbins noted that most of the interior finishes had been disturbed by this time, with some discarded and others stored in an adjacent "schoolhouse" structure. Both *in situ* and stored materials were studied by Robbins and Snow, with selected samples removed for the collection. Their final report, "Documentation of Interior Finishes," incorporated Peter Snell's earlier work, and was distributed in February 1980. Additional wallpapers were received by Harpers Ferry Center from Sitka National Historical Park in June 1980, which were separated and encapsulated in clear mylar. Hundreds of samples had been removed from the building by August 1980, ranging in size from several square inches to 10' x 4' sections, according to staff curator Sue Munro. Munro estimated that roughly 50% of the first-story finishes, and 30% of the second-story finishes, were missing by that time.

As noted above, most of the materials removed from the walls and ceilings of the Russian Bishops House were sent to Harpers Ferry Center for processing and encapsulation. These were returned to the park in 1990, where the mylar sheets were cataloged as 385 separate items within accession number 285. Other samples recovered during the restoration that had not been sent to Harpers Ferry Center were also added to the collection. These included wallcoverings salvaged by Exhibit Specialist (Preservation) Gene Ervine in 1979 and 1984 (accession numbers 125, 173, and 176); by Museum Park Technicians Kara Knox and Kermit Edmonds in 1986 (accession number 211); and by unidentified persons in 1988 (accession number 230).

The need for a comprehensive report documenting the interior finishes of the Russian Bishop's House was noted in a memorandum dated November 30, 1981, from the Assistant Manager of the Alaska/Pacific Northwest/Western Team, Denver Service Center, to the Manager of Harpers Ferry Center. Restoration of the architectural finishes, including paint and wallpaper, would soon commence, necessitating detailed documentation, as described below:

We will first need a complete wallpaper report. Heretofore, previous reports have been incomplete and disjointed, reflecting

only portions of the overall picture. It is time to prepare a comprehensive study detailing all known aspects of the interior finishes used in the Bishop's House. On a room-by-room basis all known decorative schemes should be chronicled including both paint and wallpaper finishes. David Arbogast, Historical Architect, of our staff will be researching the paint finishes and should be able to coordinate in the overall effort. His information will include known paint finishes, colors, and paint types. The wallpaper chronology should include documentation of paper types, manufacturing technology, patterns and sizes, and pigments used, with dating to provide chronological coordination between decorative schemes both within individual rooms and between rooms. Recommendations with detailed cost estimates should be provided for restored decorative schemes during the historic period (1843-1867 with emphasis on 1853) with sufficient explanation as to the rationale used in recommending these schemes. . . .

Inquiries were made about this report to Sitka National Historical Park and Harpers Ferry Center at the commencement of this project. It appears never to have been written.

Reproduction Wallpapers

Wallpapers were reproduced for six rooms in the second story of the Russian Bishop's House, based on actual samples found in the building. The wallpapers chosen by the museum professionals at Harpers Ferry Center were those believed to have been on the walls during the historic period of 1843-1867, with an emphasis on the year 1853. The silk-screened reproduction papers were procured from Scalamanré of Long Island City, New York, and installed by David Tedin of H. & H. Construction, Sitka, Alaska.

The Wallpaper and Wallcovering Collection Today

The wallpapers and wallcoverings of the Russian Bishop's House are one component of a larger architectural artifact collection that was created during the restoration of the building in the 1970s and 1980s. The "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection consists of 470 cataloged items that include more than 1,400 wallpaper samples, according to park estimates. Most of these were salvaged from the building between 1976 and 1988, and

cataloged by Sitka National Historical Park curatorial staffers between 1983 and 1990, with a few items added in 2003, as summarized in the following chart.

The cataloged samples are encapsulated in clear mylar sheets averaging 28" x 36" in size, with some smaller samples contained in zip-lock envelopes as small as 6" x 6". The collection is stored in museum cabinet drawers at Sitka National Historical Park. These wallpapers had historically been adhered to fabric tacked directly to the wood-framed walls and ceilings of the Russian Bishop's House. They include body papers, borders, and ceiling papers. Other materials removed from the walls and ceilings are also represented in the collection, including various fabric substrates, cardboard, newspapers, and scraps of paper with Russian handwriting. The nature of each cataloged sample varies greatly, with some containing a single separated wallpaper or fabric sample, others a number of separated wallpapers and/or fabrics, and still others unseparated sandwiches of wallpapers and fabrics. Not included in this cataloged collection are seven plywood crates containing unprocessed fabric and wallpaper materials that are stored in a heated maintenance storage area in Sitka National Historical Park.

Methodology

Shipping

Most of the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection from the Russian Bishop's House was air-shipped via FedEx in May 2003, from Sitka National Historical Park to the offices of the Historic Architecture Program, Northeast Region, located in the Boott Cotton Mills Museum Building of Lowell National Historical Park in Lowell, Massachusetts. The collection was transported in four large cases, and one small case, that were carefully packed by Museum Curator Sue Thorsen of Sitka National Historical Park. Not included in these shipments were the following 32 cataloged items:

A total of **438** cataloged items from the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection of the Russian Bishop's House was therefore available for this study. Also included in the

shipments were four cataloged items from another building in the park--Building 29. These four items, SITK 3684 – 3686, and SITK 329, were not included in this study.

Documentation Review

The first step of this evaluation was to become familiar with the historical evolution of the Russian Bishop's House, and all available written documentation on its wallpapers and wallcoverings. Copies of all relevant documents were made available by Museum Curator Sue Thorsen, including the following reports, files, and catalog records:

Sorting, Assessment, and Dating of the Wallpapers

The first step in the evaluation of the wallpaper and wallcovering collection was to examine each cataloged item, recording all identifying information found on labels and/or (less frequently) written directly on the wallpapers. The wallpapers were retained in their mylar-encapsulated sheets for this initial assessment. The physical arrangement of the wallpapers was also maintained as received, with groupings divided into top, middle, and bottom layers within the shipping cases. Metal rings binding selected groupings into "books" were removed, and the sheets were rearranged in numerical order by catalog number within each layer of the shipping cases.

After taking detailed notes on each cataloged item, a written list was generated identifying original room locations. The locations of the wallpapers within the rooms were also noted, and the layering sequence of each wallpaper identified. Determination of layering sequence was enabled both by the physical evidence, and by descriptions of the interior finishes written by Historical Architects Peter Snell, John Robbins, and David Snow in 1978 and 1980. Ordering sequence of the separated wallpapers could often be ascertained by design imprints preserved on the back sides of the papers. The information was summarized in chart form for each room, with cataloged samples keyed to design schemes.

Dating of the wallpapers was facilitated by the documented history of the Russian Bishop's House and a knowledge of wallpaper manufacturing and design. It is known, for example, that the building was substantially completed by 1843, but remained partially unfinished inside as late as 1844. The earliest wallpaper finishes were therefore dated "circa 1843-44." A need for interior repairs described in 1850, and a final building-materials list dated 1852 that included entries for "wallpaper," provides a date of "circa 1851-52" for the next wallpaper schemes. Extensive repairs were made in 1887, including the installation of new canvas substrates in five rooms, which were presumably finished with new wallpaper. The physical evidence of the wallpapers themselves was also helpful in dating. Wood-pulp papers began to replace rag paper stock beginning around 1855. Popular wallpaper designs and colors changed over the years, as chronicled in Catherine Lynn's book: *Wallpaper in America: From the Seventeenth Century to World War I* (1980). Unfortunately, no similar documentation is available on Russian-manufactured wallpapers. Border papers were found to be a particularly useful dating device, being very narrow in the mid-nineteenth century and growing to an expansive width by 1900. Less helpful was the method of design printing, since rotary machine-printing of wallpapers had been developed by 1840 and would have

been available, along with earlier printing methods such as block printing, by 1843-44.

Finally, redecorating of the Russian Bishop's House was generally conjectured to have occurred at intervals of approximately every five to ten years, lacking substantial documentation for this work.

Photographic Documentation

Only the best representative wallpapers were selected for photo-documentation of the wallpaper and wallcovering collection. Samples were carefully removed from their mylar envelopes and temporarily mounted to a vertical cloth-draped board. Artificial light was provided by a tripod-mounted tungsten bulb. A wooden ruler was included in every shot for scale. The camera used is a digital SONY CD Mavica, model MVC-CD 500. Photographs were shot at the highest-available resolution of 5.0 megapixels.

Wallpaper Descriptions

Each wallpaper was documented with a photograph and the following descriptive information.

Catalog Number. This is the catalog number assigned to the photographed sample. In most cases the wallpaper is also represented elsewhere in the collection. The catalog numbers for these additional samples are recorded in the "Wall & Ceiling Finishes Summary" for each room.

Accession Number(s). Most of the cataloged items have two accession numbers: one assigned by Harpers Ferry Center (HFC), the other by Sitka National Historical Park (SITK).

Sample Location. This is the location of the cataloged sample, usually noted on a label affixed to the mylar sheet, and/or in the catalog records. Locations were less frequently found written directly on the back sides of the samples.

Date. This is the approximate date of wallpaper installation, which commonly occurred shortly after wallpaper production.

Sequence. The order in which the wallpaper was installed, such as the earliest surviving wallpaper, the second surviving wallpaper scheme, etc.

Wallpaper Type. Three types of wallpaper were identified at the Russian Bishop's House: body papers that were applied to the walls, border papers applied to the upper walls near the ceiling, and ceiling papers applied to the upper walls and ceilings.

Design Description. A brief description of the wallpaper pattern and colors is provided.

Paper Type. The paper stock is identified as either "rag" or "wood pulp." As mentioned earlier, wood pulp paper began to be used for wallpaper paper stock beginning around 1855. Wood pulp paper was identified using the Barrows Groundwood Test, a spot chemical test of phloroglucinol solution and diluted hydrochloric acid. All wallpapers at the Russian Bishop's House used continuous rolls of paper, which became available in the United States around 1835-40.

Printing Technique. Wallpapers at the Russian Bishop's House were either block printed or rotary-machine printed. Block printing of wallpapers is an early technique that used carved wooden blocks to transfer paint to paper. Machine printing of wallpapers was in use in the United States by the 1840s. Thick, chalky paints are characteristic of block printing, while machine-printed papers used thinner, faster-drying paints.

Manufacturer. Manufacturer's information was found on selected papers, printed either on the back side of the paper, or in the selvedge (i.e., the overlapping edges of the paper).

Reproduced by Scalamandré in the 1980s. Selected wallpapers are identified that were reproduced by Scalamandré of Long Island City, New York, for the restoration of the Russian Bishop's House to its circa-1853 appearance. These are body and border papers that are located in six rooms of the second story: Rooms 203, 204, 206, 207, 208, and 209.

Use in Other Rooms. If a wallpaper pattern was also used in other rooms of the Russian Bishop's House, this is so noted.

Coordinating Papers. Other wallpapers that were used in a wallpaper scheme are identified, such as a border paper and ceiling paper hung in coordination with a body wallpaper.

FINDINGS

Represented Rooms

Cataloged items of the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection were removed from 26 rooms in the Russian Bishop's House, including 16 rooms in the first story, and 10 rooms in the second story. Rooms were identified with room numbers, and less frequently by room names. Room numbers had been assigned to the rooms in 1975, which may be found keyed to floor plans in the appendix at the end of this report.

Of the rooms listed above, four were eliminated from this study because the cataloged items therefrom did not contain wallpaper samples. These were Rooms 109, 110, 111, and 113.

⁴ Note that some cataloged items contain materials from several rooms, such as SITK 5981 that is an assemblage of paper fragments from Rooms 203, 206, 207, and 209.

In addition, 18 cataloged items were found to be from unidentified or ambiguous locations, and were also eliminated from this study. These include:

SITK 2321, 2357, 2359, 2360, 3688, 11930, 11931, and 14123: from unidentified locations

SITK 2329-2331: from Room 125—an unknown room designation

SITK 5959: from the "Priest's Quarters"

SITK 5963-5965: from the "first floor"

Challenges

A number of challenges were encountered with this study, which are described below.

Organization of the Collection

Museum Curator Sue Thorsen took special care to retain the order of the collection as it was stored at Sitka National Historical Park when packing the cases for transport to Lowell, Massachusetts. It was observed upon their arrival, however, that the collection was not well organized. While most of the cataloged items were roughly grouped by room and in numerical order by catalog number, the ordering of the rooms was jumbled, and samples from the various rooms were scattered throughout the collection. Samples from Room 208, for example, were found in all five of the cases, and from Room 211 in four of the cases. Samples from the first-story rooms were intermixed with samples from the second-story rooms. Catalog numbers were also disorganized, such as the 11800 series that was intermixed in cases 1 and 2.

Separations of many of the wallpapers were undertaken by Harpers Ferry Center in the 1970s and 1980s. Unfortunately, the sequencing of the wallpaper layers was either not recorded or has been lost. Also, a comprehensive report on the wallpapers that was to have been prepared by Harpers Ferry Center in 1981-82 was never done.

Labeling of the Collection

Most of the collection's cataloged items are identified with a paper label affixed to the outside of the mylar envelopes, with information that includes room number and/or name, and location of the sample within the room. Many of these labels were found to be either completely missing or in the process of failing. Luckily, most of the information on the labels has been recorded in the catalog records.

While most of the cataloged items are identified with original room locations, the precise location within the room is often not recorded. Some of the samples are noted to be from a "wall" or "ceiling," but more exact information such as upper wall or lower wall, and the precise wall within the room, is lacking. This is particularly important in rooms with complicated evolutions, such as Rooms 114-117, that were originally constructed as one large room.

A number of cataloged items were labeled with ambiguous locations, such as "first floor," or "Room 125"—an unknown room designation. These include SITK 2329-2332, 5959, and 5963-5965. Others are completely missing location descriptions, such as SITK 2321, 2357, 5959, 2360, 3688, 11930, 11931, and 14123. Mislabeling of selected cataloged items was also encountered, such as SITK 11899 labeled "Room 211," which should be Room 209.

Previous Studies

On-site evaluations of the Russian Bishop's House wallpaper finishes were undertaken in 1978 and 1980 by Historical Architects Peter Snell, John Robbins, and David Snow. While helpful, these studies also present some problems. First, the room numbers used by Peter Snell were later changed to correspond to the room numbers used by the historic structure report. Second, the nomenclature is sometimes ambiguous. For example, a wall fabric described as "burlap" by one person is referred to as "canvas" or "linen" by another. Third, some errors were found in the Robbins report, such as body papers that had been misinterpreted as wide borders, or wallpapers that had been missed altogether. Finally, few if any, dates were assigned to the various wallpaper schemes in these earlier reports.

Scope of the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" Collection

The "Wallpaper and Wallcovering Collection" of the Russian Bishop's House is an assemblage of materials that had been removed from the walls and ceilings of the building during its restoration from 1976 through 1988. These were found to include wallpapers, various fabrics, Russian newspapers, scraps of papers with Russian handwriting, heavy papers, and cardboard. The focus of this study was the wallpapers, although the fabrics were also evaluated. Three types of wallpapers were identified at the Russian Bishop's House: body papers applied to the walls, border papers applied to the upper walls and ceiling, and ceiling papers applied to the upper walls and ceilings. Most of the collection consists of body wallpapers (76 patterns), followed by border papers (53 patterns), and ceiling papers (20 patterns), for a total of 149 wallpaper patterns. The wallpapers span a time period of approximately 100 years, from circa 1843-44 to circa 1940. The bulk of the collection, or about 78%, is of 19th-century vintage, with the remainder dating to the 20th century. The earliest wallpapers, dating to circa 1843-44, were recovered from the walls of the second-story rooms. Papering of the walls in the first-story rooms appears to have commenced several years later, circa 1850s-60s. The practice of papering the ceilings was later still,

beginning around the 1880s.

All of the wallpapers from the Russian Bishop's House were printed on continuous rolls of paper. The earliest employed rag paper stock and were either block or machine printed. The wallpapers installed after circa 1860 often used wood-pulp paper and were most commonly machine printed. Border papers varied in size over the years, with the earliest borders measuring less than 2-inches wide, and later borders up to 18-inches wide.

A summary of the wallpaper types and patterns recovered from the Russian Bishop's House is presented in the following chart. Note that plain papers, such as a monochromatic-green body wallpaper, have been counted as a pattern type. Also, one ceiling pattern was found to have been used in both circa 1880 and 1887, making the total number of ceiling patterns "20" versus "21."

Russian Wallpapers and Wallcoverings

It was not possible to distinguish Russian-made wallpapers from those made in America or Europe, based on their designs or manufacturing characteristics. Maker's marks found printed on the back sides of three body wallpapers provide the only definitive evidence of Russian-manufactured wallpapers. Two of these papers had been hung on the west side of the chapel (Room 204)—the earliest circa 1843-44, and a later paper circa 1855. A third paper was installed in the guest room (Room 208) circa 1851-52. A translator has identified two of the papers as having been made in "St. Petersburg." All three papers were block printed on rag paper stock. The catalog numbers for these Russian papers are SITK 3992, 5968, and 5996.

Other wallcoverings identified as being of Russian origin include paper scraps with hand-written script, canvas, and newspapers. Paper scraps had been used on the exterior walls and ceilings of the rooms circa 1843-44 to cover the seams of the logs and boards.

Walls were also covered with burlap and canvas fabric, one sample of which was found to have two manufacturer's marks printed in Russian on the back side. This marked material is a densely woven canvas with hand-stitched seams that was recovered from the east side of the chapel (Room 205). The canvas was likely installed sometime before 1847, based on an inventory of that date that describes canvas on the walls and ceiling of the chapel. Russian newspapers were also used in selected rooms to line the walls and ceilings throughout the years. One sample only, salvaged from the west hall (Room 121), retains a header page dated "1898."

American and English Manufacturers

Wallpapers produced by American, and possibly English, manufacturers were also hung in the Russian Bishop's House, as evidenced by manufacturer's names on the papers. These were most commonly found printed in the selvedge, or overlapping edge, of selected wall and ceiling papers. Most of these marked papers are of later vintage, dating from circa 1870 to circa 1930. However, one early paper was also identified—a body wallpaper that was hung in Room 208 circa 1843-44. The manufacturers are listed below, in alphabetical order, along with additional information on the company, if available.

"Barringt[on]"

"Barringt [?]" is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1843-44 body wallpaper used in Room 209. (SITK 3997)

No information was found on this company, which was most likely American or English.

"Benton Hea[]"

"Benton Hea[?]" is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1900 body wallpaper, used in Rooms 114-117. (SITK 14057)

No information was found on this company, which was most likely American or English.

"Birge & Sons"

"Birge & Sons" is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1887 ceiling paper used in Rooms 204, 205 & 206. (SITK 11705)

The M.H. Birge, Company, later known as M.H. Birge & Sons, began manufacturing wallpaper in Buffalo, NY, in 1878. (Source: Catherine Lynn, *Wallpaper in America*, 1980, p. 455.)

"W. Campbell & Co., N.Y."

"W. Campbell & Co., N.Y." is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1870 body wallpaper hung in Room 209. (SITK 11855)

"William Campbell and Co." was referred to as an "old New York manufacturer" in a wallpaper publication dated 1911. (Source: Catherine Lynn, *Wallpaper in America*, 1980, p. 312.)

"M. How"

"M. How" is printed on the back side of a painted wallpaper scrap used to cover a crack in the log walls of Room 201 circa 1843-44. (SITK 3994)

No information was found on this company, which was most likely American or English.

"Howell Brothers"

"Howell & Brothers" is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1887 body wallpaper hung in Room 207. (SITK 11855) Also found printed in the selvedge of a circa-1900 body wallpaper hung in Room 207 is "Howell Brothers, Philad'a, 446 PM." (SITK 11792)

The Howell Brothers company began in Albany, NY, in 1813, moved to Philadelphia in 1817, and was the country's largest wallpaper manufacturer by the 1880s. (Source: Catherine Lynn, *Wallpaper in America*, 1980, pp. 173 & 409.)

"T.S. & Co."

"T.S. & Co." is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1900 body wallpaper hung in Room 209. (SITK 11848)

The full name of this company has not been identified.

"Ware Bros. W/W/ [P?] Mfg. Co."

"Ware Bros. W/W/ [P?] Mfg. Co." is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1930 body wallpaper hung in Rooms 114-117. (SITK 14054)

No information was found on this company, which was most likely American.

"York Card & Paper Co."

"York Card & Paper Co." is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1887 body wallpaper hung in Room 107 (east portion) and Room 118. (SITK 14066)

"Y.C. & P. Co., York, P.A." is printed in the selvedge of a circa-1890 body wallpaper hung in Room 209. (SITK 14080)

The York Card and Paper Company is known to have been in operation in 1907, based on their contribution to a wallpaper publication of that date. (Source: Catherine Lynn, *Wallpaper in America*, 1980, p. 467.)

Other

"Conforms to Specifications No. U.S. [illegible], Dept. of Commerce" is printed in the selvedge of a ceiling paper hung in Rooms 107 (east portion), 121, 207, and 211 circa 1930. (SITK 14039)

Although the manufacturer is not identified, there can be little doubt that this was an American company. The United States Department of Commerce and Labor was created in 1903, later renamed the Department of Commerce in 1913.

Use of Similar Wallpapers

Similar wallpaper patterns were found to have been used in several rooms of the Russian Bishop's House during selected redecorating campaigns. Examples include two wallpaper designs printed in bright blue on a white ground that were hung circa 1855 in Rooms 120, 206, 207, and 209. A wallpaper with gray-blue floral design was installed circa 1865 in Rooms 120, 208, 209, and 211. Plain-green wallpapers were hung circa 1887 in Rooms 201, 203, and 208, paired with 18"-wide borders. Wallpaper and ceiling patterns resembling Delft tiles were preferred circa 1905, and hung in Rooms 107 (east portion), 118, 207, and 211. A linear floral pattern was chosen circa 1910, printed in three different colorways: white for the east portion of Room 107, blue and yellow for Room 118, and gold-bronze for Room 207.

Wall and Ceiling Fabrics

Fabrics of various types were used on the walls and ceilings of the Russian Bishop's House over the years, beginning as early as the original construction of the building circa 1842-43. Three types of fabrics were identified in the collection: burlap, canvas, and cotton ticking. These were attached with tacks, only a few of which were retained in the collection with the fabric materials. The purpose of the fabric was to provide a smooth surface on the wooden walls and ceilings for either painting or hanging of wallpapers. The following chart describes these fabrics, the rooms in which they were found, and their approximate dates of use.

Restoration Wallpapers

Historic wallpapers were replicated by Scalamandré in the 1980s for six rooms in the second story of the Russian Bishop's House. These had been chosen by the curatorial staff of Harpers Ferry Center as being appropriate for the circa 1843-1867 restoration period, with an emphasis on 1853. Of the wallpapers chosen, those for five of the six rooms were identified by this study as likely dating to circa 1843-44, and one to circa 1851-52. These are summarized below:

1. Room 203 (Layman's Room): body wallpaper and border, *circa 1843-44*.
2. Room 204 (Chapel): body wallpaper, *circa 1843-44*.
3. Room 206 (Reception Room): body wallpaper and border, *circa 1851-52*.
4. Room 207 (Dining Room): body wallpaper and border, *circa 1843-44*.
5. Room 208 (Guest Room): body wallpaper and border, *circa 1843-44*.
6. Room 209 (Bishop's Study): body wallpaper and border, *circa 1843-44*.

Introduction

The wallpapers of the Russian Bishop's House that are preserved in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection are presented on the following pages. These wallpapers have been sorted by room, and within each room in sequence from the earliest surviving wallpaper scheme to the latest. The following rooms are included in this report: 101-103, 107 (east portion), 107 (west portion), 114-117, 118, 120, 121, 124, 201, 203, 204, 205, 206, 207, 208, 210, and 211. Each room chapter is divided into subsections as described below.

General Information

This section describes the room location, room name, cursory evolution, the number of cataloged items from the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection, and a summary of the materials contained in the samples.

Cataloged and Encapsulated Samples

The catalog numbers of the materials in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection are listed for each room, along with the location of the cataloged item and a general description of the cataloged materials. For more detailed descriptions of the cataloged materials, see the catalog records on file at Sitka National Historical Park.

Wall & Ceiling Finishes Summary

This is a summary, in chart form, of the decorative wall and ceiling finishes for selected rooms in the Russian Bishop's House. The information in this section was derived from several sources. These include reports on the interior finishes of the Russian Bishop's House dated 1978 and 1980 by Historical Architects Peter Snell, John Robbins, and David Snow; field notes and descriptions of existing conditions in 1975; and the physical evidence of the actual wallpaper and wallcovering samples preserved in the collection. "Circa" dates were assigned for each decorative scheme by Barbara Yocum, the author of this report. Catalog numbers, highlighted in bold, are keyed to the decorative schemes. Catalog numbers with an asterisk include wallpaper and/or fabric samples that were photographically documented and described on a separate page. Those decorative schemes for which no catalog numbers are noted have no samples in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection.

Individual Wallpapers

Representative samples of each wallpaper, and selected other wallcoverings included in the collection, were photographed and provided with written descriptions. See the "Methodology" section of this report, pages 12 and 13, for a detailed explanation of this photographic and written documentation.

ROOMS 101-103

ROOMS 101-103

General Information

Rooms 101, 102, and 103 are located in the first story, southwest corner, of the Russian Bishop's House. This is a complicated space that was originally partitioned into three rooms and a vestibule used by the resident priest (Father Michael) on the west side, and a classroom for seminary students on the east side. The walls partitioning the vestibule are believed to have been removed in 1851, and the walls partitioning the classroom in 1887. New walls creating Rooms 102 and 103 may have been added in the 1930s, when the first story was remodeled as apartments.

Fourteen cataloged items from Rooms 101-103 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Thirteen are from the walls, and one from an unidentified location. These had been salvaged between 1976 and 1979 during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include painted burlap and body wallpapers.

ROOM 118

General Information

Room 118 is in the first story, north side, of the Russian Bishop's House. It was originally constructed for use as the consistory, or church meeting space. The room was initially divided into three rooms, with partition walls on the south side creating two smaller spaces. These partitions are believed to have been removed circa 1887, when the walls of the enlarged room were covered with new canvas.

Nineteen cataloged items from Room 118 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Fifteen are from the walls and four from unidentified locations. These had been salvaged between 1976 and 1979 during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in these samples include scraps of undated Russian newspapers, paper scraps with Russian handwriting, stenciled canvas, body wallpapers, border papers, and gray cardboard.

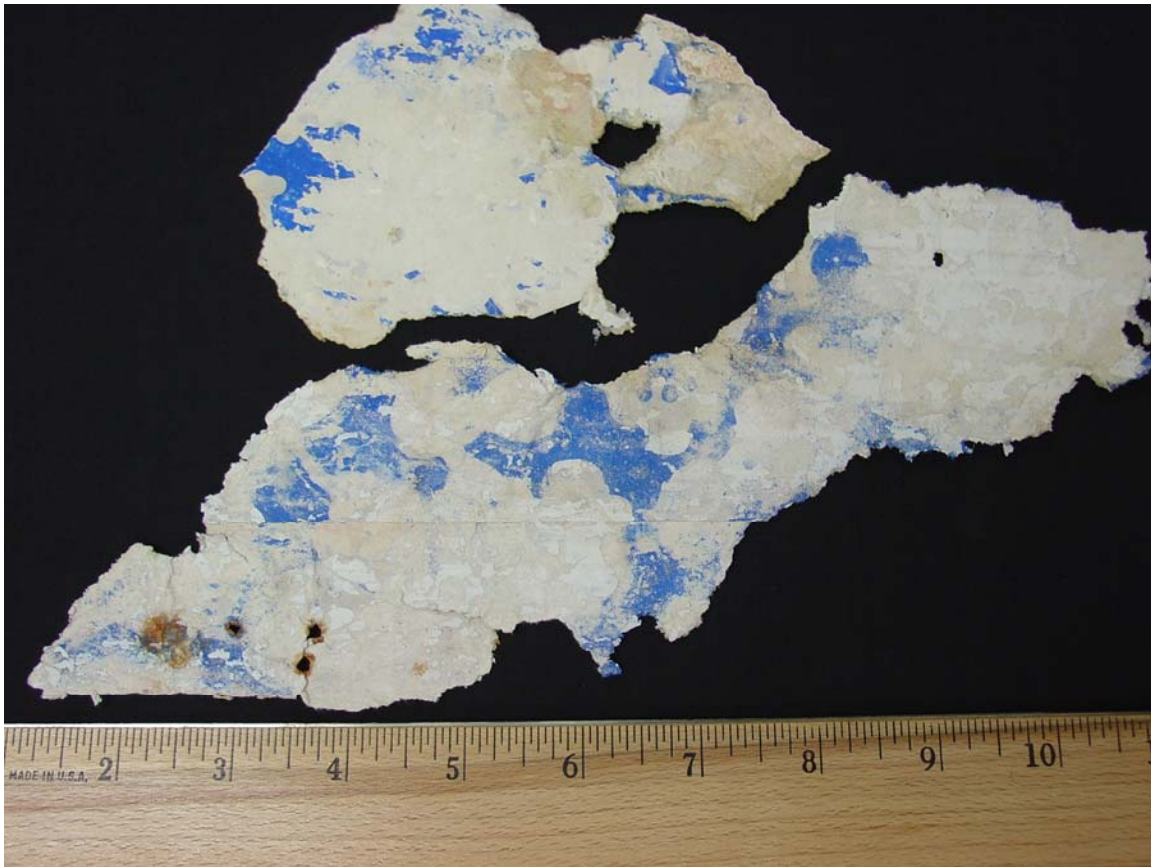

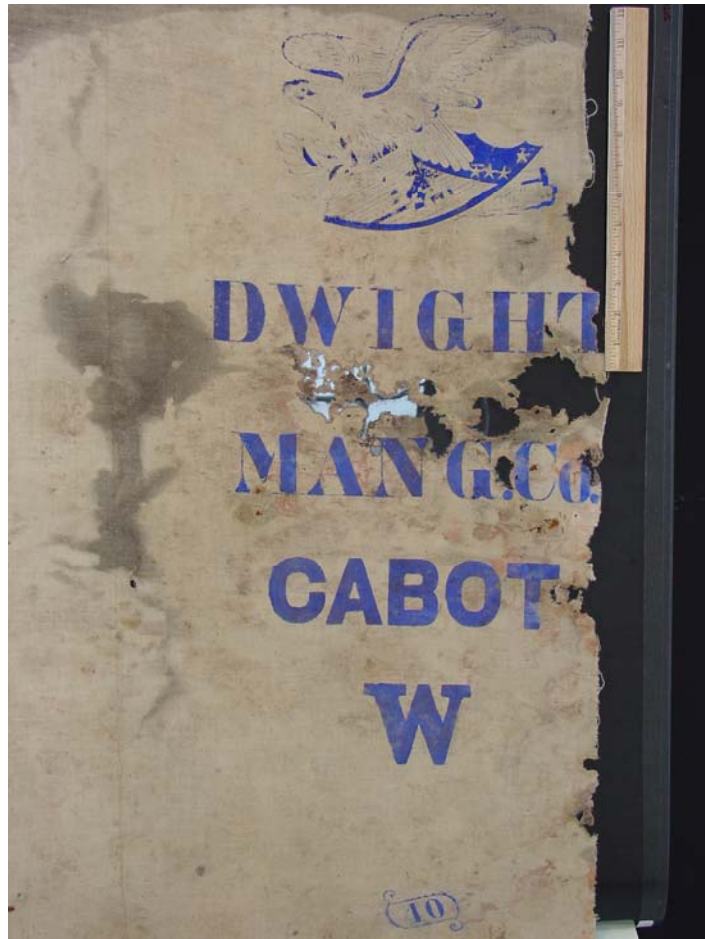

ROOM 203

ROOM 203

General Information

Room 203 is in the second story, northwest corner, of the Russian Bishop's House. This room was designated for the use of the lay brother(s) on the original plan of the building. It has been referred to as both the "layman's room" and the "meditation cell" by National Park Service researchers.

Twenty-six cataloged items from Room 203 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Ten are from unidentified locations within the room, nine from the walls, and seven from the upper walls. These had been salvaged in 1976-79, 1984, 1986, and 1988, during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include blue-striped cloth (ticking), Russian newspapers, paper scraps with Russian script, burlap, canvas, body wallpapers, border papers, and ceiling papers.

General Information

Room 205 is the eastern half of the bishop's chapel located in the second story, southwest corner, of the Russian Bishop's House. The chapel is partitioned by a wooden, north-south wall called the iconostasis.

Twenty-eight cataloged items from Room 205 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. These had been salvaged in 1976-79, 1986, and 1988, during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Ten were removed from the walls, nine from the ceiling, and nine from unidentified locations within the room. Materials contained in the samples include two types of canvas, body wallpapers, body papers, and ceiling papers.

ROOM 206

General Information

Room 206 is a large room in the second story, north side, of the Russian Bishop's House. It was originally used as the "reception room" or "bishop's parlor," according to the 1981 *Historic Structure Report*. The name "drawing room" was assigned by Historical Architects John Robbins and David Snow, and used by the Historic American Buildings Survey.

Forty cataloged items from Room 206 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Nineteen are from the walls, eleven from the ceiling, and 10 from unidentified locations. These had been salvaged between 1976 and 1979, and in 1988, during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include burlap, canvas, paper scraps with handwritten Russian script, body wallpapers, border papers, and ceiling papers.

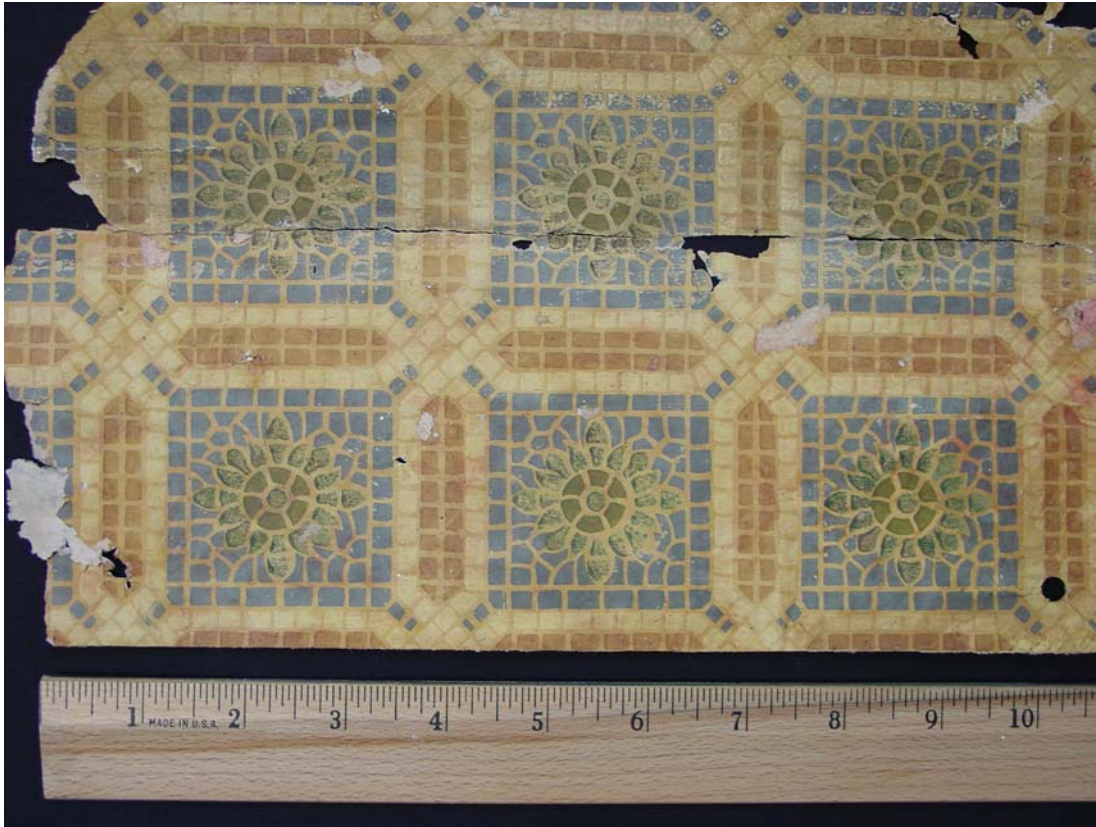

ROOM 207

General Information

Room 207 is in the second story, north side, of the Russian Bishop's House. It was used originally as the "dining room," according to the 1981 *Historic Structure Report*.

Thirty cataloged items from Room 207 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Nine are from the walls, three from the ceiling, and eighteen from unidentified locations. These had been removed between 1976 and 1979, and in 1988, during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include a light-weight canvas, body wallpapers, border papers, and ceiling papers.

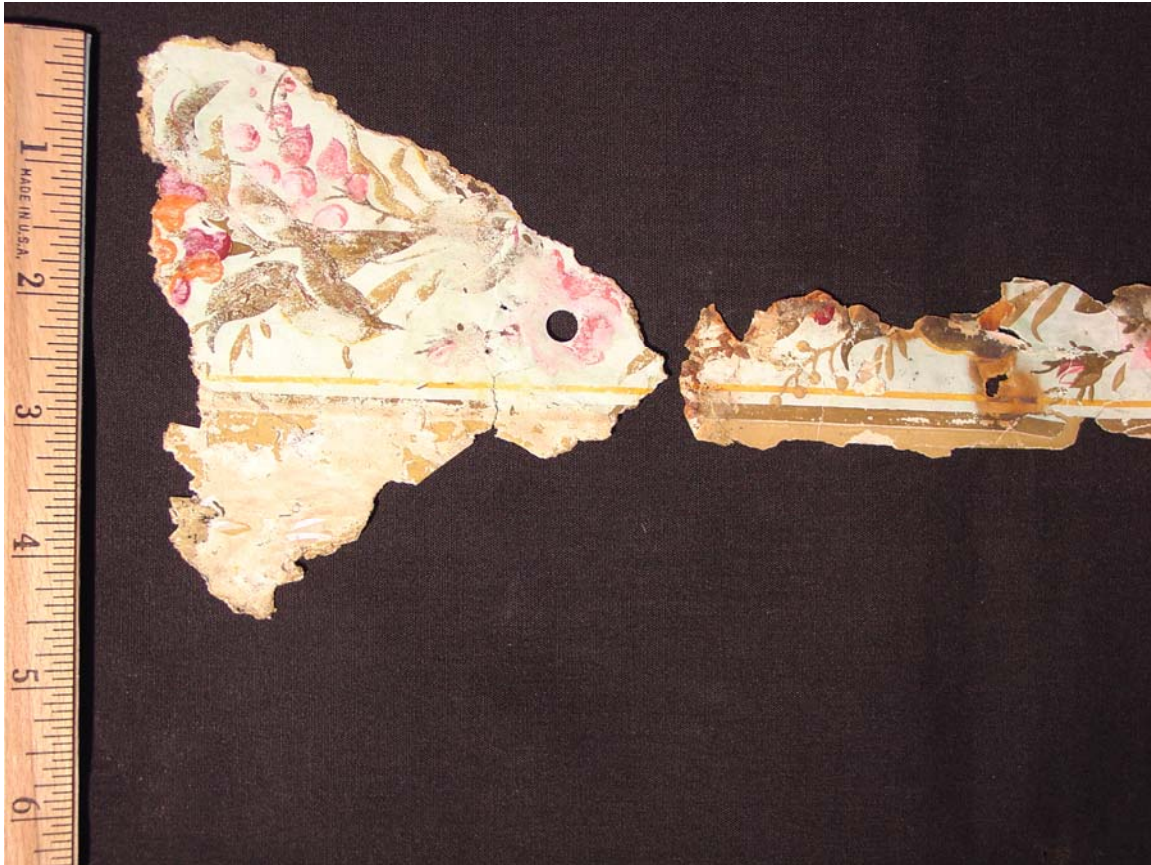

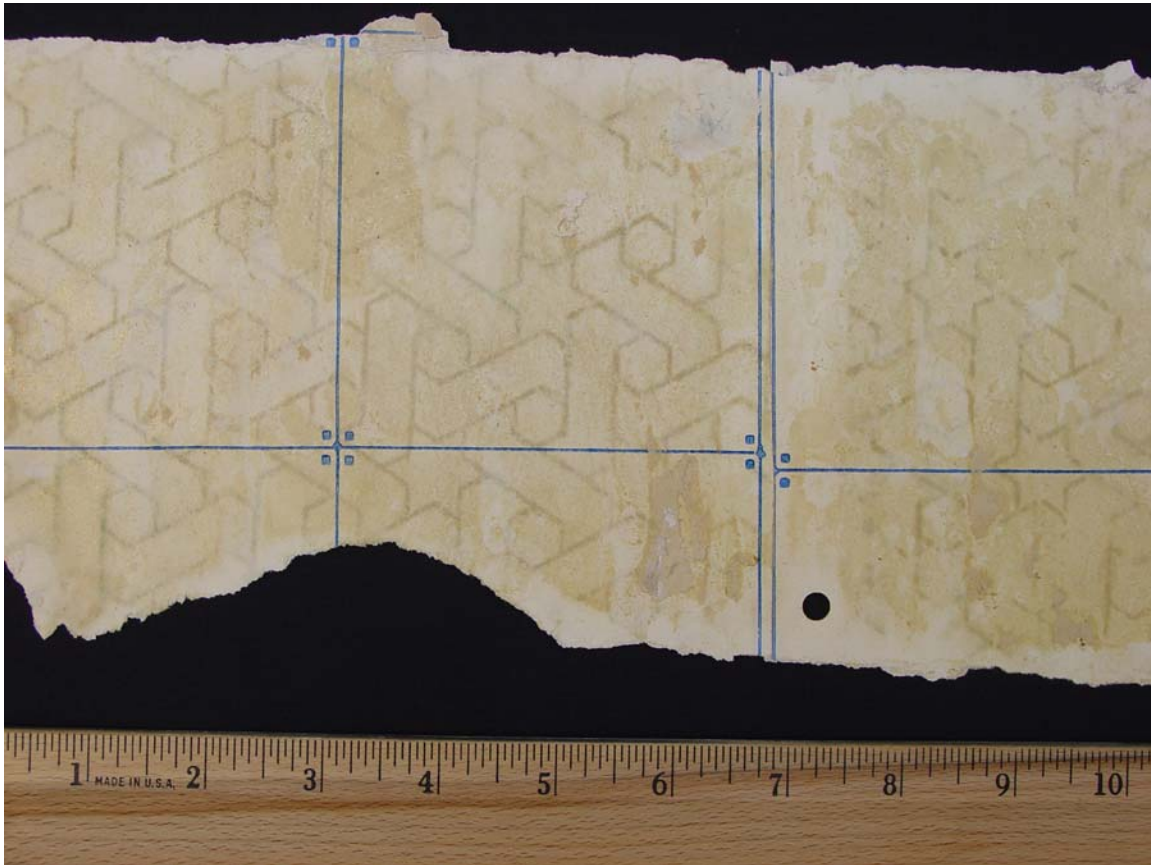

Room 208 is in the second story, south side, of the Russian Bishop's House. It was used originally as a "guest room," according to the 1981 *Historic Structure Report*. The room has also been called the "drawing room" by Historical Architects John Robbins and David Snow, and the "bishop's parlor" or "guest room" by catalogers.

Thirty catalog items from Room 208 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Nineteen are from the walls and eleven from unidentified locations. These had been removed between 1976 and 1979, and in 1986, during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include burlap, body wallpapers, and border papers.

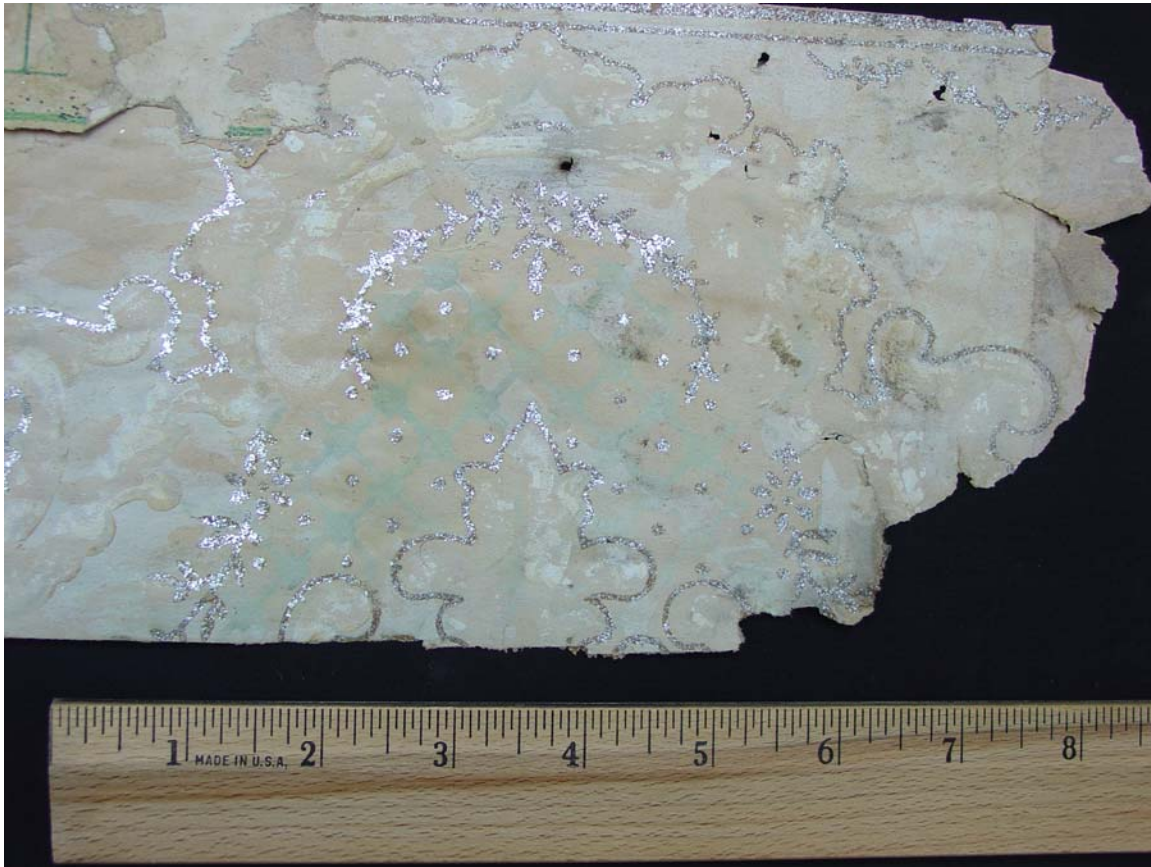

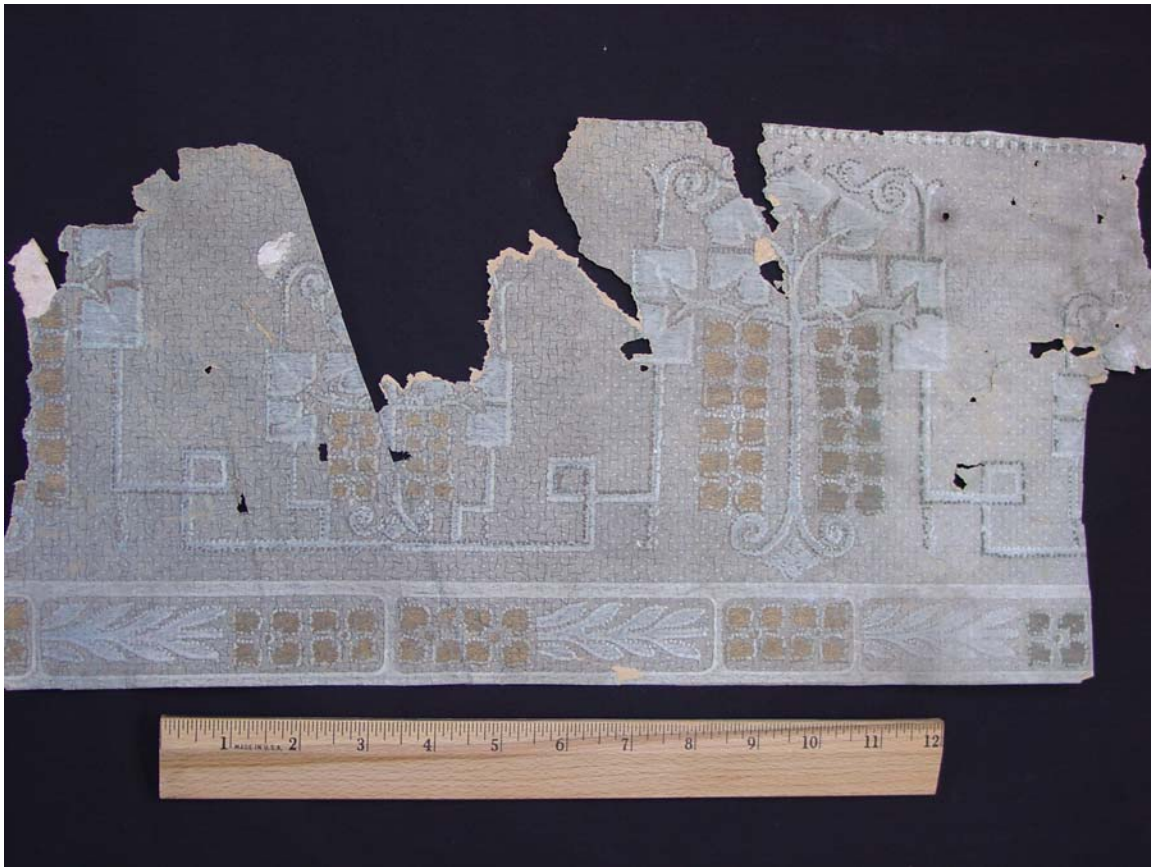

ROOM 209

ROOM 209

General Information

Room 209 is in the second story, southeast corner, of the Russian Bishop's House. This room was originally partitioned into four separate spaces occupied by the bishop, according to the 1981 *Historic Structure Report*: a study on the south side, a library and cloak room in the northeast corner, and a sleeping room in the northwest corner. Collapse of the ceiling in the bedroom occurred in March 1890, due to the weight of wet insulating sand and gravel. The partition walls had been removed by 1975. The entire undivided room was generally referred to by catalogers as the "bishop's bedroom" or "study."

Seventy-four cataloged items from Room 209 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Twenty one are from the walls, three are from the ceiling, and fifty are from unidentified locations. These had been removed between 1976 and 1979 during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include burlap, canvas, scraps of paper with Russian handwriting, plain brown paper, body wallpaper, border papers, and ceiling papers.

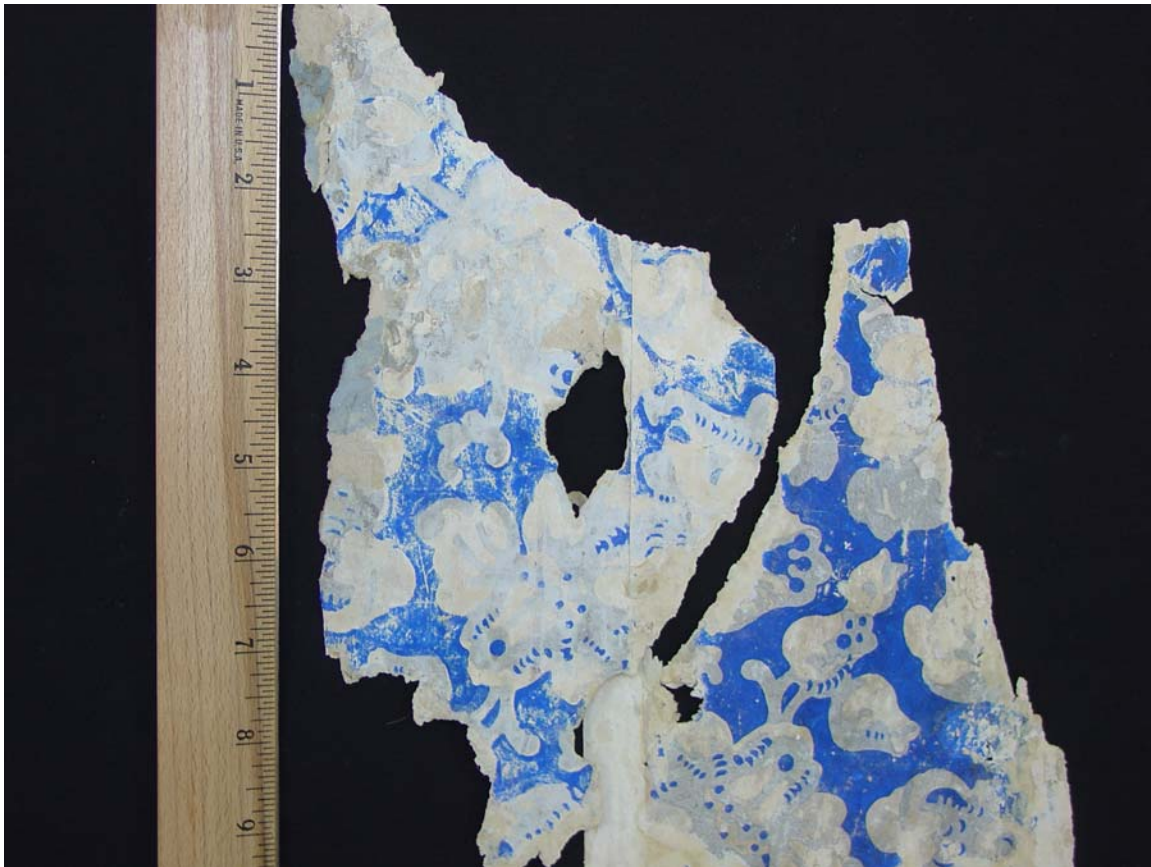

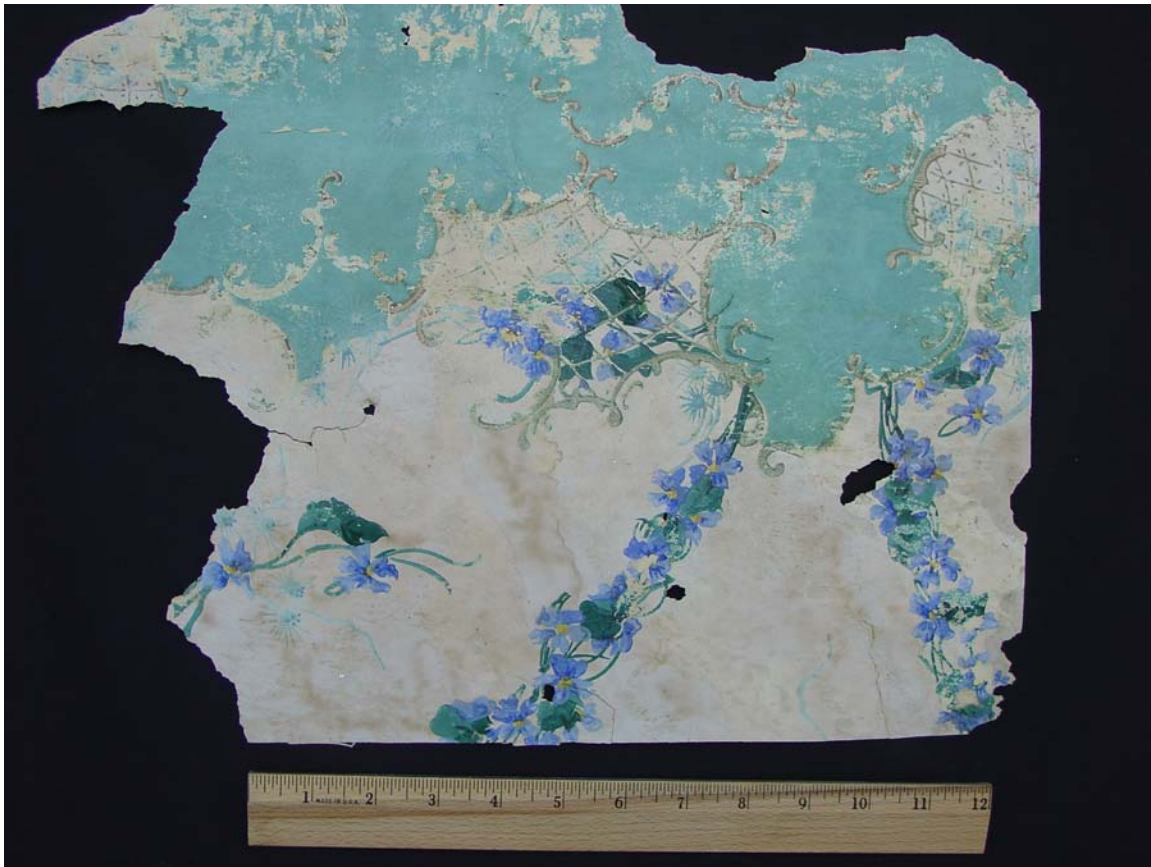

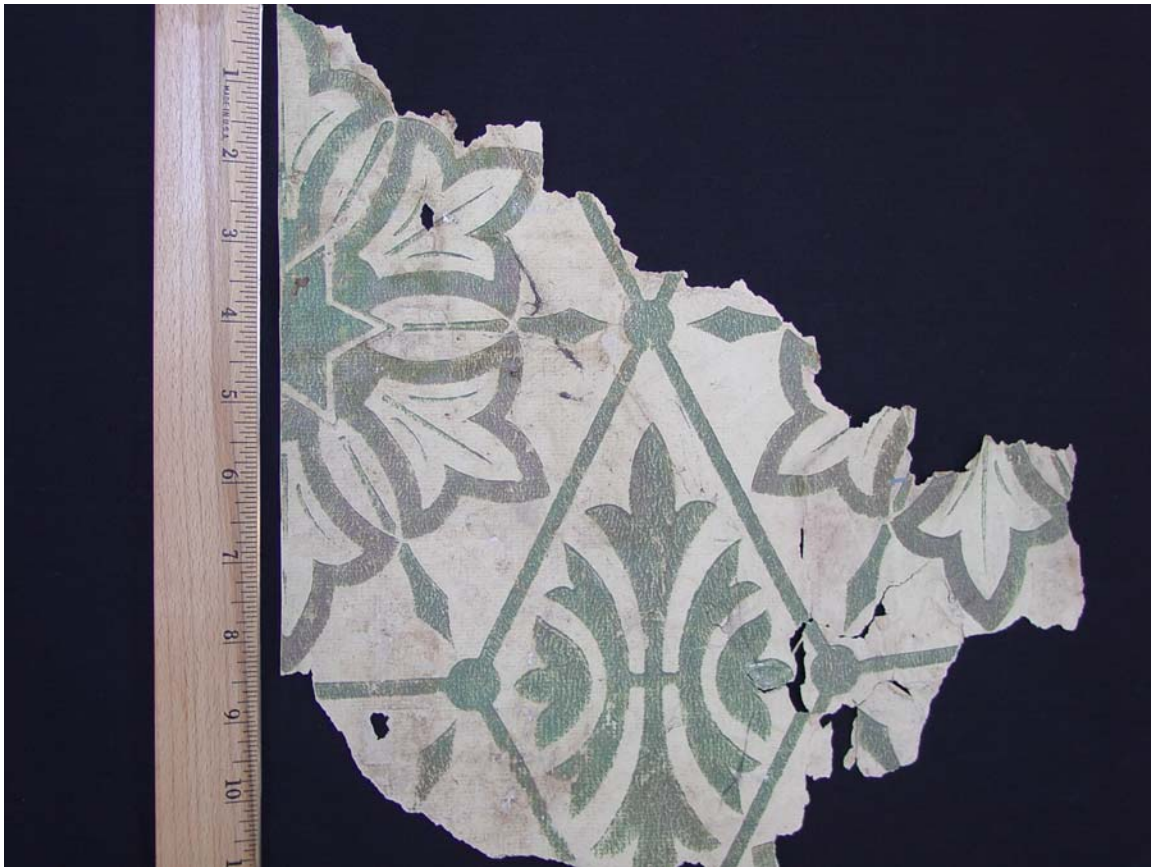

ROOM 211

General Information

Room 211 is in the second story, northeast corner, of the Russian Bishop's House. This room was originally a "pantry," according to the 1981 *Historic Structure Report*. It had been remodeled as a bathroom by 1975, most likely when plumbing was introduced in the building circa 1930s.

Forty-two cataloged items from Room 211 are in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection. Ten are from the walls, four from the ceiling, and 28 from unidentified locations. These had been salvaged between 1976 and 1979 during the restoration of the building to its circa-1853 appearance. Materials contained in the samples include a paper scrap printed in Russian, canvas, gray cardboard, body wallpapers, border paper, and ceiling paper.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Physical Organization

The "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection of the Russian Bishop's House is poorly organized, being partly sorted by room, partly in numerical order by catalog numbers, and partly by size. It is recommended that the cataloged items be physically resorted and stored by room, and within each room by catalog number. Such a system would consolidate the surviving historic wallpapers and wallcoverings for each room, thus facilitating their study.

Paper Labels

Many of the identifying labels affixed to the exterior surfaces of the mylar sheets have either fallen off, or are in the process of falling off, due to failure of the glue adhesive. Several options are available: (1) reattach the labels; (2) move the labels to the inside of the mylar envelopes; (3) transcribe the information on the labels onto the mylar envelopes using indelible ink.

Crated Materials

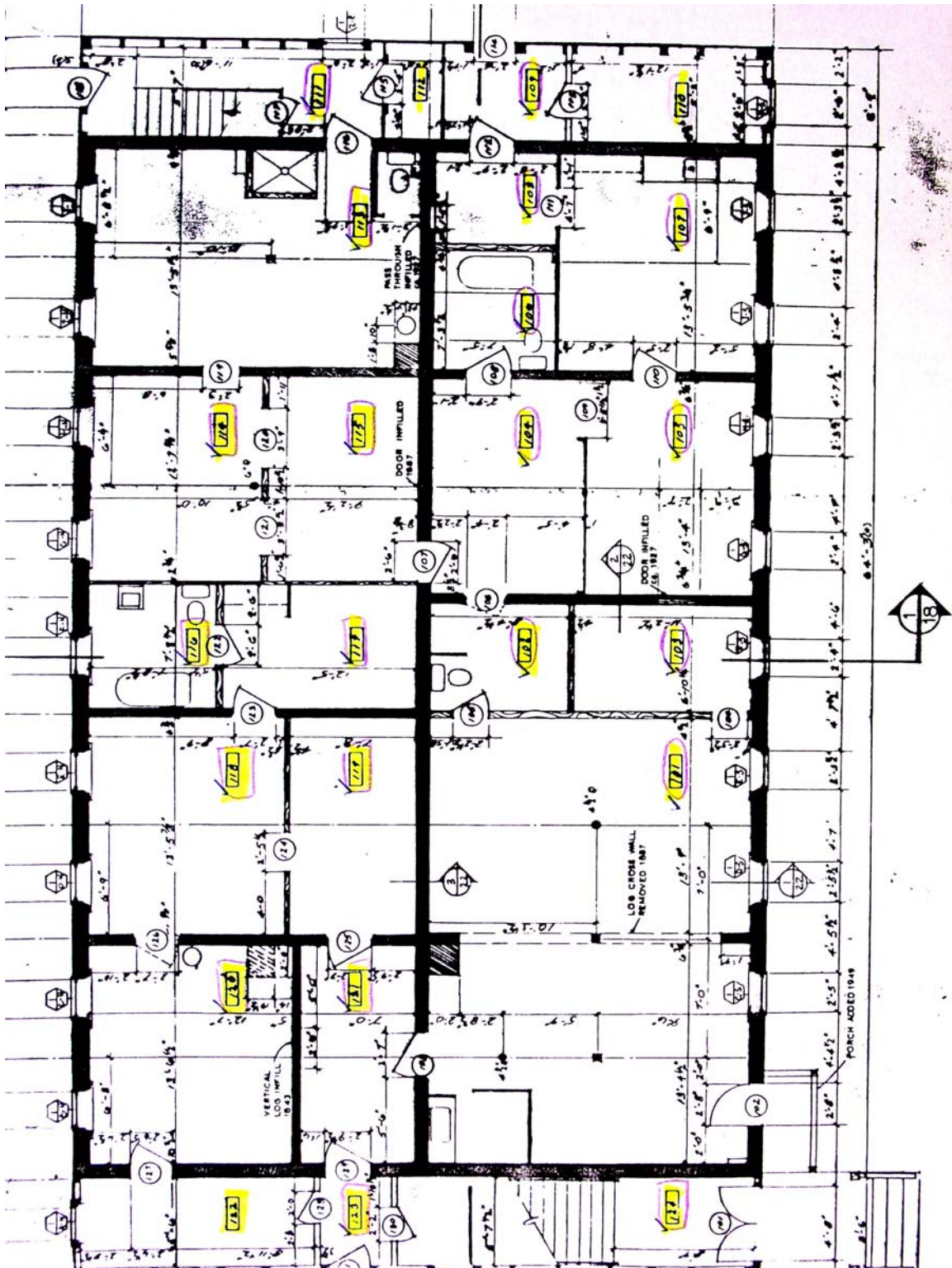
Seven plywood crates containing wallpapers and wallcoverings are currently stored in a heated maintenance storage area at Sitka National Historical Park. These materials had been removed from the rooms of the Russian Bishop's House during its restoration from 1976 to 1988. Although the crates are accessioned, the materials within the crates have never been evaluated. Sue Thorsen, Museum Curator, reports that the crates consume a large portion of the park's limited museum storage space, and storage conditions have resulted in some mildewing of the samples.

The contents of the seven crates should be assessed using this report as a reference. This assessment should include the following:

1. Identify the room from which each crate of material was removed.
2. Photo-document the contents of each opened crate.
3. Determine whether or not the samples contained within each crate are already represented in the "Wallpaper and Wallcovering" collection.
4. If the materials in the crates duplicate the samples in the collection, this should be noted and the excess materials deaccessioned.
5. If, on the other hand, missing or better samples are in the crates, these should be saved and incorporated into the collection. A "better" sample might include a full repeat of a wallpaper pattern, or the full width of a border paper.

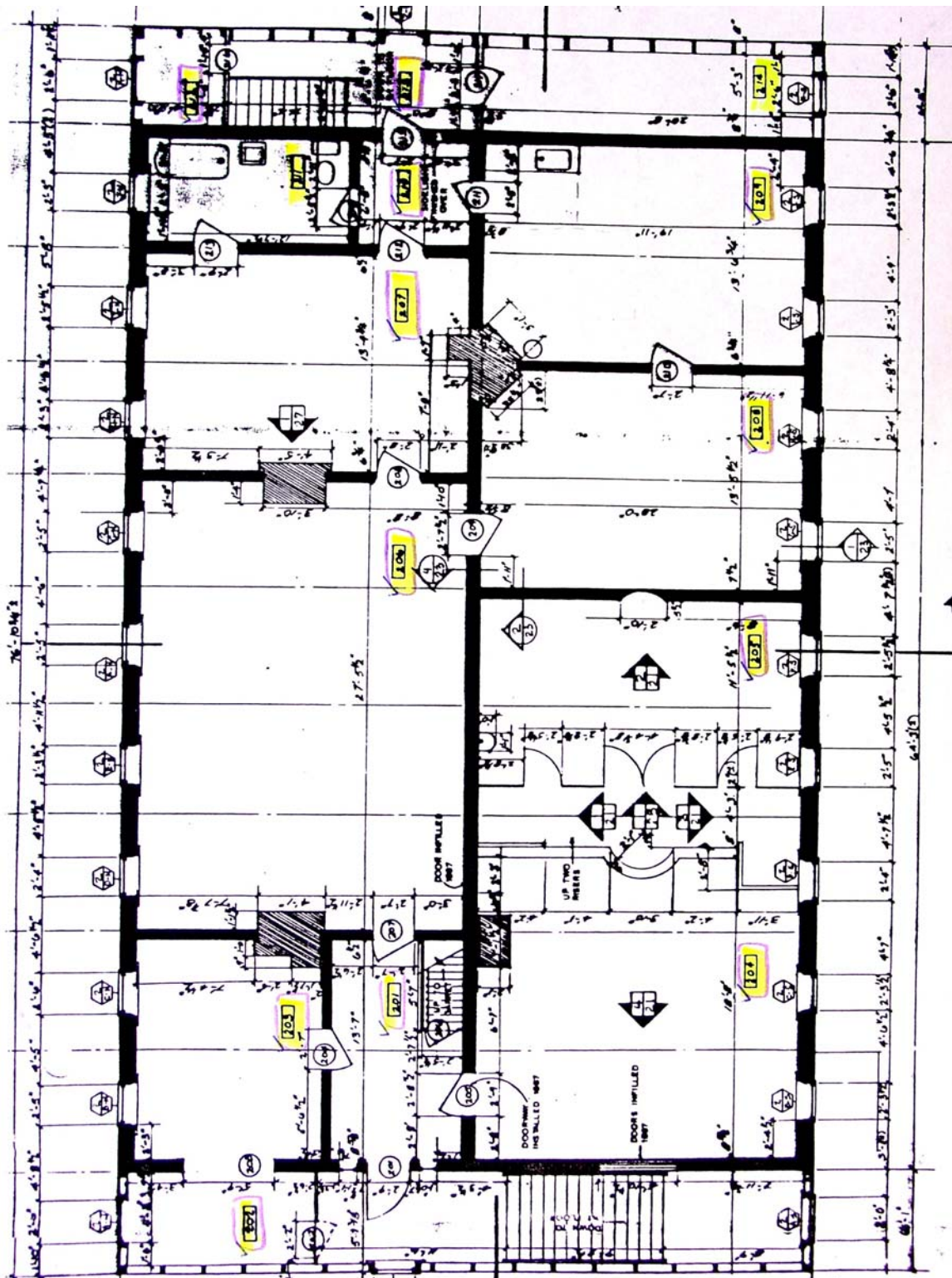
